Race Workers Needed by Mike Cavanaugh

Have you ever wanted to get close to the action at Road Atlanta or the track at Barber? I learned at the SCCA, Southeast Division Meetings in January you can. Just say you are interested in working a club race at a meeting of club racers and people will jump at the chance to have you come work their next event. I've always thought of working a race as standing out on the

track with a flag. If that's not what interests you, they need people to work in registration, grid, timing and scoring, race control, starter...
There are many areas where you can help.

I was told that you should work a series of worker areas before deciding on what you want to specialize in. Then you will have an appreciation of the way the

areas of a race interact and depend on each other for a smooth event. Once you decide, you should study the General Competition Rules (GCR) relating to that specialty and its close associates since you are expected to observe and administer the rules.

the first event that you work. Each time you work you need to have the chief of the specialty, F&C, Timing... sign an experience card that they were satisfied with your performance. Divisional licenses are issued by the Divisional Chief of that specialty and on average they are looking for a year of experience. They want to be comfortable that you can walk into a divisional race and have no problems performing your duties. Na-

tional licenses are the next step and require working outside the division to qualify.

Race workers are needed at every event in the Southeast Division. The Alabama and Chattanooga regions have an event on Labor Day weekend where TVR members can help. Please think about it.

If you are interested in getting involved and close to the action, contact the race chairman of an event. Let them know you are interested in getting started. They will advise you when to show up, what to bring and find an area to work where you should not be in harms way and can learn from the experienced people.

Mechanics Toolbox submitted by Jim Burris

Hammer - Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate expensive parts not far from the object we are trying to hit.

Mechanic's Knife - Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door, normally containing seat covers and convertible tops.

Electric Drill - Normally used for spinning steel pop rivets in their holes until you die of old age, but it also works great for drilling mounting holes in trunk floors just above brake and gas lines

Pliers - Used to round off bolt heads.

Whitworth Sockets - Once used for working on older British cars and motorcycles, they are now used mainly for impersonating that 9/16 or 1/2 socket you've been searching for the last 15 minutes.

Drill Press - A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your drink across the room, splattering it against that freshly painted car part you were drying.
